

The emu is the largest bird living on the Australian continent. It is a flightless bird with tiny wings only one-tenth of the length of its body. After moulting, an emu's new feathers appear nearly black. As they age, the feathers eventually fade to pale brown.

Adult females weigh about forty kilogrammes while males weigh about 5 thirty-six kilogrammes. A running emu can make a stride of more than 2.5 metres with ease.

Emus live in Australia, from the high mountainous region to the coast where they can have access to fresh water. They are common in forested coastal regions and tend to avoid the dry, uninhabited parts of Australia. The 10 birds usually breed in the winter months from May to August. The nest is made up of twigs or leaves. Under favourable conditions, the female will lay nine to twelve eggs, each weighing more than half a kilogramme. It takes about eight weeks for the eggs to hatch. The tiny emu chicks often leave the nest three days after being hatched.

Emus only eat foods that are rich in nutrients such as fruits, flowers, seeds, green vegetables and insects. To help their stomach grind the food, emus take in pebbles together with their food. Since an emu's diet is so nutritious, the emu grows quickly and reproduces in large numbers.
