Indonesia is one of the biggest paper producing countries. Its large companies, however, are being accused of destroying large parts of Sumatra and other Indonesian (16) islands by cutting down rainforests and replacing them with plantations. Environmental organisations such as Greenpeace are worried that the habitats of endangered species will be destroyed.


