What is Run For Hope?

Their Inspiration

Mr Isadore Sharp, CEO and founder of the Canadian-based Four Seasons Hotels & Resorts, lost his fourth son, Christopher, to melanoma cancer in 1978. In memory of his son, Mr Sharp spearheaded a worldwide programme that established annual runs raising funds for cancer research in cities where their hotels and resorts are located. He was inspired by Terry Fox, who despite having lost a leg, ran across Canada to raise money and cancer awareness in 1980. Increasingly convinced that more needed to be done, Mr Sharp ensured his legacy lived on even after Terry's death. Four Seasons employees worldwide have since been supporting Terry's dream in striving to advance cancer research, and *Run For Hope* is one of their efforts. Every Four Seasons hotel and resort actively supports local and regional efforts to find a cure for cancer.







In Singapore

NCCS is staffed with a multi-disciplinary team of specialists and a pool of internationally-trained doctor-scientists who carry out quality research that is applied to clinical care. To provide much needed seeding and bridging funds for an array of translational and clinical research programmes at the NCCS, the NCC Research Fund was established in 2005 to serve as the flagship fundraising and grant-making channel.




