A powerful earthquake, registering 7.2 on the Richter scale, hit the western part of Japan on 7th January, 1995, at 9546 hours (Japan time). Its epicentre was about twenty kilometres beneath Awaji Island, some thirty kilometres from Kobe.

It was Japan's worst earthquake since a very powerful one struck eastern Japan in 1923. The 1995 earthquake had inflicted the greatest loss of life and damage to buildings, roads, bridges and railways in Kobe and the coastal cities nearest to Awaji Island. Osaka, Japan's second largest city, also suffered significant damage, bringing the death toll to just over five hundred.

Japan is an earthquake-prone country but the area around Kobe had not been known to be a danger zone. It is therefore surprising that an earthquake of this magnitude should hit the area.

There are quite a number of seismographs and sensors that detect earth tremors throughout Japan. These instruments are supposed to help earthquake researchers predict earthquakes. On an early warning, people could be evacuated to safer places. It was disappointing that in the case of the Kobe earthquake, no early warning had been given.

Unexpectedly, many of the newer roads and buildings were badly damaged. These roads and buildings had been engineered and constructed to withstand earthquakes. Fortunately, the Kobe nuclear power plant managed to escape damage. If radioactivity had leaked as a result of the damage to the plant, it would have triggered off severe and long-lasting damage on health and the environment.

The Kobe earthquake inflicted such massive damage that reconstruction would be long and arduous. The early-warning system too has been receiving the extra attention it needs, especially so because a big one is expected to strike the Tokyo region in the next twenty to thirty years, according to earthquake researchers.

Itu walked with his eyes on the ground, missing no clues. His ten-year-old son, Raja, tiptoed along behind. We moved closer when Itu stopped to study a rat hole. The moist clay bore the perfect impression of a snake's belly. "It's a medium-sized cobra," said Itu. "Probably a female. It was out at night, probably hunting and entered the hole before dawn." We were impressed but not surprised at all.

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Itu used a crowbar to dig. The instant he saw the snake's tail, he grabbed it and stepped back with one quick motion, hauling out a metre-long cobra, its neck flared in fright. The hunter pinned the hissing head to the ground with the steel bar, then gently slipped his prize into a bag. It would not do to injure the snake. It was destined for the Snake Park.

Such was the life-style of Itu, who was from the tribe of the Iralus. Unfortunately, this life-style is being eroded, bit by bit. **Urban sprawl**, the conversion of forests into land for housing, and pollution are both making it more and more difficult for Iralus to survive as hunters. Kevin and I were interested in the tribe's plight and wanted to help them find ways of adapting to their changing environment.

Another trip out with Itu and Raja in search of snakes yielded an unexpected **bonus**. Raja climbed up a tree and came down with a honeycomb, which we all shared. The Iralus ate the baby bees as well as the honey. Later, we wadded through a weed-choked canal to watch

Raja hunt water snakes. He used a stick to tickle a crab hole in the muddy embankment until a fat water snake dived out. Raja snatched up the thrashing reptile and was bitten on the hand. The bite was not poisonous but it was painful.

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Like all Iralu snake catchers, Itu disdained hospitals and modern medical treatment. Instead, he placed his trust in his herbal mixture called veley, a greenish tea which he prepared himself from bark and herbs, and gulped it down. The Iralus believed the potion is an antidote for snakebite. Itu had used the antidote and had survived ten cobra bites. Itu's way of curing poisonous bites by using bark and herbs might seem useless to a Westerner but to an Iralu, this is the only cure, the most effective one.
