As a non-perishable and high-calorie food supplement, Horlicks was considered suitable for (18)

emergency packs. Therefore, scientists began taking it on expeditions to the Polar regions.

It is believed that drinking Horlicks may assist sleep, but such a claim has been difficult to prove. As the Horlicks brand grew, the brothers decided to sell their company.
