

Richard and George Cadbury's entire world-view was shaped by their personal values. These values moulded their early childhood experiences, their social and marriage opportunities, their choice of career, and their allencompassing view of the wider purpose of their chocolate business.

From the earliest years they had seen their father endeavour to apply 5 these ideals to the community. John Cadbury was deeply concerned about society's 'savage indifference to the child'. In the 1820s, when John was developing his shop on Bull Street, it was not uncommon for children to be carted off from the workhouses 'to the cotton mills or the mines', to be used there as if they were disposable. John was horrified by the misery of children 10

John's greatest outrage was reserved for the barbarous practice of using workhouse boys as young as five as chimney sweeps. Many suffered twisted spines, damaged joints or were maimed by falls. After years of campaigning, John was delighted when a law was passed which eventually 15

On the home front, George and Richard persevered with their efforts to keep the company afloat. George saw the relationship with the employees as key. Sitting in the stock room at 6.00 a.m. over breakfast, he encouraged workers to discuss issues in their lives, and tried to help with their education, 20 reading aloud to them and exchanging views on topics of interest or stories from the Bible. By today's standards such actions might seem paternalistic, but at a time when many people could not read, they were greatly valued. Many staff members spoke of their enjoyment of these small meetings, which were 'more like family gatherings'.

In spite of their losses, George and Richard pressed ahead with plans to increase wages, with a new payment structure that tripled women's pay. There was an evening sewing class once a week at the factory, during which George read to the group. Richard and George were the first employers in Birmingham to introduce half days on Saturdays and bank holidays. 30

In the eyes of some, this was enough for her to be considered a warship. However, she was not nearly that grand. In fact, she was just a simple freighter, christened the Vyner Brooke. She was far from the largest but she was one of the most 5 reliable ships of the Sarawak Steamship Company. In a matter of days, the ship would gain prominence as she was about to run for her life.

The Vyner Brooke would carry no freight on this trip; her cargo consisted solely of humans. Those on board would be under Royal Navy leadership. 
