

Therefore, the caregivers must understand the panda well. When it is time to feed the panda, the caregiver carefully wraps the baby panda's body with a cotton gauze patch, exposing only its head. Holding the panda in one hand and a milk bottle in the other, the caregiver gently touches the panda's mouth with the bottle teat. Sometimes, the caregiver squeezes the bottle to smear some milk on its lips, hoping that the milky flavour will entice the baby to open its tiny mouth.

It is also important that the hand holding the panda imitates a mother's embrace so that the baby feels comfortable and safe. If the baby gets too nervous or frightened, it will not feed. The caregivers are well-trained and are very patient, and surprisingly, they are mostly men!

A bronze statue of a dog stands tall outside the Shibuya Train Station in Tokyo, Japan. Tourists may see the statue as yet another decorative art-piece, but it serves to remind the people of Japan the importance of loyalty. The creation of the statue was inspired by a heart-warming story of a man and his dog.

In 1924, Professor Ueno found a lost puppy and took it home. He named the dog Hachiko. Professor Ueno worked in Tokyo University and he took the train to and from his workplace. Hachiko would greet the professor at the Shibuya Train Station at 3.00pm each day after work. This routine continued until May 21, 1925, when the professor did not return at the usual time.

After his master's death, Hachiko was given away. But he always escaped. He would show up at his old home after each escape, only to be greeted by unfamiliar faces. Eventually, Hachiko seemed to realize that Professor Ueno and his family no longer lived in that house. So he went to look for his master at the train station. But each day, Hachiko waited in vain.

People who frequented the Shibuya Train Station had seen Hachiko and Professor Ueno together in the past and brought Hachiko treats and food. Some tried to "explain" to Hachiko that his master was never coming back; they spoke to him and shooed him away but Hachiko came back each day, at 3.00pm, without fail.

Hachiko died on March 8, 1935, at the same spot where he had been waiting for the past nine years. His faithfulness to his master impressed the people of Japan. In memory of him, a statue in his likeness was erected at the entrance of Shibuya Station. That entrance was later named "Hachiko-guchi", meaning "The Hachiko Exit".
