Dolphins are marine mammals closely related to whales and porpoises. Almost forty species of dolphins, varying in size from 1.2 metres to 9.5 metres, exist in the world today. They inhabit the shallow seas where they hunt for fish and squid. Dolphins are ranked amongst the most intelligent of animals. Their friendly appearance and seemingly playful attitude have made them popular in human culture.

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Dolphins occasionally leap above the water surface. Scientists are not always certain about the purpose of this behaviour. The reasons behind it vary. One possibility is the dolphins' way of locating schools of fish by looking at above-water signs like feeding birds. Another explanation is their way of having fun. Play is a fairly important part of dolphins' lives and they can be observed playing with seaweed or with their own kind.

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However, around the world today, dolphins face many dangers. A major threat is the pollution of their living environment by industrial, agricultural and household wastes.

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The destruction of mangrove forests and coral reefs poses another threat to dolphins. These places play a vital role in their food supply. They are the sheltered breeding grounds of marine creatures that dolphins feed on. An estimated 58% of mangrove forests in Southeast Asia have already been cut down for coastal development and prawn farming.

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Other threats come from boats and fishing nets that injure or kill a large number of dolphins every year. Collisions with boats are common as dolphins have the tendency to go near them. Dolphins are also frequently caught in fishing nets as they like to find food in thriving waters that attract fishermen.

Nine-year-old Billy Tan had rehearsed intensively for a musical. It was one of the highlights at the annual Graduation Ceremony of Crystal Primary School.
