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The Internet can be a wonderful resource for children. They can use it to do research,
communicate with teachers and friends, and play interactive (51)
Children who are old enough to punch in a few letters on the keyboard can have access

That is why it is important to (53) aware of what our children see and
hear on the Internet, who they meet, and what they share about themselves online. It is
wise to talk with them about our concerns, take advantage of resources to protect them,

Many Internet service providers provide parent-control options to block certain materials
