## Did you know?



Badminton was played more than 2000 years ago in Greece, China and India. It was named 'badminton' after Badminton House, the home of the Duke of Beaufort, England. Football, or soccer, began in England in 1863. The education authorities observed that the sport inculcated in students qualities such as loyalty, cooperation and team spirit. Participation in football became compulsory in many schools.



Table tennis, first known as 'ping pong', started in England in the 1880s as an after-dinner pastime. The game became popular, and by 1901, table-tennis tournaments were conducted all over England.





Basketball was invented in 1891 in Massachusetts, USA, by a teacher, James Naismith. He wanted a game that was less injury-prone than football.

Golf originated from Scotland in 1497. It was played by striking a feather-stuffed ball with club-shaped tree branches. Today, with modern materials, the equipment is more sturdy.



Tennis started in France as a game where players used their palms to hit balls. In 1873, a Londoner, Walter Wingfield, invented the game, 'Playing Ball' using rackets and this has evolved to the modern tennis we play today.





The history of sports goes back at least 3,000 years. In the beginning, sports often involved the preparation for war or training as a hunter, which explains why so many early games involved the throwing of spears and rocks, and sparring one-on-one with opponents. With the first Olympic Games in 776 BC, the Ancient Greeks introduced formal sports to the world.

John Cooper, a veterinarian, worked for the Morris Animal Foundation to save the endangered population of mountain gorillas in Central Africa. When informed that his services were needed to save a young injured mountain gorilla, he immediately began preparing laboriously for the challenging task at Volcano National Park.

Upon reaching the national park, John met up with two guides. Together, the trio trekked the rainforest. Soon, they saw a group of gorillas resting in the trees, oblivious to their presence. John put on his glasses for a closer look and spotted a gorilla whose hand had a red, raw appearance. A wire was twisted around its hand. John stood ready with his tranquiliser gun, waiting for the right moment. He was aware that a miss would cause the group of gorillas to scatter in fright. What was worse was that it would prompt the silverback, the large male leader of the group, to charge.

After a short wait, the young gorilla was seen following its mother. John fired and the dart hit it. The young gorilla started to feel dizzy. It could not walk properly, so it climbed onto its mother's back. The next moment, it slipped gently off its mother and lay in a drowsy heap on the ground. John and his guides watched from a distance. The adult gorillas surrounded the young one and looked at it, clearly confused. Fortunately, while trying to move, the young gorilla rolled down the slope towards John and the guides. John ran to it and threw a piece of cloth over it to hide it from sight. He knew that gorillas lost interest in an object if they could not see it. True enough, the adult gorillas, who had been so interested a few seconds before, began to move back into the forest.

John knew that he had to act quickly before the silverback became aware of what was going on. He started working on his sleepy patient by removing the wire and cleaning its severely-wounded hand. Then, it started to rain. The trio sought shelter under a tree and waited for the young gorilla to wake up. After a while, the youngster got up and crawled towards the other gorillas. John followed the young gorilla to ensure that it rejoined its group. While walking back to his guides, John heard a deafening roar coming towards him.

The silverback had appeared and was charging at John. Its charge was just a warning. Next, it would attack. John knew that he had to convince the silverback that he meant no harm. He immediately looked down to the ground, trying to show that he was not a threat to the gorilla. John crouched perfectly still and waited. Accepting John's gesture as it was intended, the silverback moved backwards. Thinking that the silverback had already left, John lifted his head.
