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

As my foot hovered above the ball, a sharp pain jolted through my left leg. Frustrated, I sighed and tossed it instead, my mind drifting to the day that everything changed.

It was my dream to be selected by a talent scout. Determined to impress, I sprinted across the field, reaching for the ball. The grass felt damp against my cheek, but all I could think about was the pain. I clenched my fists, digging my nails into my palms, hoping it would drown out the ache in my leg. I tried to move, but a jolt surged through me, making me bite my lip to stifle a scream. Nausea welled up in my throat. 15

"Coach is calling an ambulance," someone said, his voice muffled.

"I didn't mean to..." Jordan's voice trembled with guilt.

"Oh, my goodness! You are bleeding!" Raizal, who was seated at the bench, exclaimed. He dropped his water bottle and dashed towards me.

Minutes dragged. The pain throbbed relentlessly. I clenched my fists, trying to take my mind off the pain. When the paramedics finally arrived, the pain had spread to my head. I could not believe my misfortune. 20

"You'll be okay," Raizal assured me. "We'll get through this together."

In the ambulance, panic surged through me. All I could think about was the match — the one I had trained so hard for, the one that would prove I was the team's best striker. Now, that dream was slipping away. 25

Days later, the doctor broke the news. I would not be able to play soccer for a year. Holding back my tears, I was speechless. I had broken my left ankle again. When I stepped out of the doctor's office, Raizal was waiting for me. He placed a reassuring hand on my shoulder and mumbled, "It's not the end. You'll come back stronger." 30

I wanted to believe him, but the dull ache in my chest was worse than the one in my leg. What hurt the most was not the injury — it was watching my team move on without me. Someone replaced me as the striker and they went on to win match after match. I felt like an outcast, forced to relinquish my spot on the team. 35
