





Eddie also goes beyond the typical responsibilities of a concierge by lead the RunWestin programme, where he takes guests on runs around the city, starting and ending at the hotel.



"Can I confirm that I will be teaching eight of you?" Miss Lim asked with a smile.

"Yes, there are eight of us," Big Sister replied politely. "There's me, all the way to a little sister who is turning seven in a month. We also have two younger siblings, but they are too young for lessons. Will you take the job?" Surprisingly, Miss Lim did not need much persuasion. "Children should not lose their right to a proper education," she shared. She agreed to teach us thrice a week for four tins of rice every fortnight. Rice was in demand and the Japanese would punish anyone giving away rice or receiving rice from others.

Soon, our English lessons were in full swing. She focused on increasing our vocabulary and setting our grammar right. I learned to construct proper sentences and got my tenses and prepositions correct. However, there was one problem. As the Japanese prohibited the teaching of English in schools, Father feared we might be caught learning it at home. "Surely if we were caught, the consequences would be dire," he said.

Father hatched a plan in case Japanese soldiers barged in during lessons. We were to have as few books as possible on the table, and someone had to be on the lookout at the window. If soldiers were spotted, the lookout would give a signal, and we would hide the books in the wardrobe and disperse. Then we would pretend to do something idle, like play cards or marbles. To prepare us for such a situation, Father made us rehearse.

One day, it really happened. Our neighbour, Auntie Kong, slipped into our house, flustered, while Miss Lim was teaching us. "Japanese soldiers are raiding the house next door," she whispered to Mother anxiously. Immediately, we swung into action. When the soldiers barged into our house a few minutes later, all they saw was the family spending a leisurely afternoon together. The older siblings were playing cards with a visiting friend, while the younger ones were engaged in a game of marbles. The soldiers did a quick inspection of the house and left. Mother was very grateful to Auntie Kong and declared her a good neighbour. "If she had not risked coming to warn us, we all would have been caught," Mother said.

When it was time to pay Miss Lim, Father packed four heaped tins of rice in a brown paper bag. Miss Lim then wrapped it up with crumpled old newspaper to make the parcel look as inconspicuous as possible. On her way home, she had to pass Fairfield Girls' School, then occupied by the Japanese military. They hoisted a flag at the gate, and anyone who walked by had to have their bags checked. As she carried a parcel of rice, Mother advised her to take the road behind the school instead to avoid trouble.

Miss Lim continued to risk her life for education till the end of the war. Others like us owe her a great debt.




