



The early inhabitants of Papua New Guinea lived off the land around them. They were hunters and food gatherers. As time passed, the people began to acquire the knowledge of gardening and cultivating plants. A nearly self-supporting economy was established. Plants common to tropical regions, such as taro, yam, banana, sugarcane, breadfruit, sago palm and coconut made up a large part of their diet. Ever 5 present were also many pigs, dogs and chickens.

People of Papua New Guinea lived along coastal strips and, at times, on densely wooded islands and in the rugged highland regions. They were split into groups and lived in huts built on the banks of rivers or in remote villages along rain-soaked mountain ridges. Despite their differences, these people shared two common 10 and invaluable friends – the waters of the river and the natural forests of the land. The waters of the river were a life-sustaining necessity for all. To the hunter, the forests meant birds and animals for food, as well as fur and brilliant feathers for personal adornment.

The early inhabitants of Papua New Guinea living in the mountains planted their 15 gardens in the clearings near their huts and villages. From the forest, they obtained wood for carvings. They also made garden tools, spears, clubs, bows and arrows as well as many other weapons for warfare and hunting. Additionally, the forest gave them fuel, bark and material for clothing. It provided logs for their dwellings, thatching for roofs and material for walls. Bamboo and cane bridges were built to link rivers and 20 gorges.

Among the inhabitants of Papua New Guinea, coastal dwellers also looked to the forest to meet their needs. Using various parts of a tree, they made their canoes, fishing nets and traps. The forest provided the materials needed to build their great multiple log boats. In the vast swampland surrounding the Purari River, the log canoe 25 was their sole means of transport, as these people used neither wheel nor animal for transportation.

Yes, indeed, the forest truly was their ever-giving friend.
