Drug use is <u>viewed</u> as a growing threat to young people in many countries. Every day, more and more people try drugs and are hooked. Many <u>continue</u> to use them and over time, this affects their physical and mental health.

Glue sniffing, or solvent abuse, is the most common form of drug-taking, particularly among children. Certain types of glues and household products contain solvents which give off fumes. When breathed in, they produce a kind of intoxication, rather like (23) drunkenness. Further sniffing causes giddiness, confusion and often aggressiveness. Sometimes, sniffing produces hallucinations – imaginary pictures that can cause panic.

Contrary to popular belief, solvent sniffing is not truly addictive. It seems to run in (25)

Open up your refrigerator and you might find beans from South America, apples from New Zealand or cheese from Switzerland. Your shoes may have come from Vietnam, the family car could be from Japan and your cell phone may be from Finland. Without fast and affordable transportation, we would not have any of these things. We also need reliable transport options to move around. Many people live in the countryside but work in the city, 5 take vacations in faraway places and make regular trips to visit family or friends. They want comfortable rides to get to their destinations punctually.

Unfortunately, modern forms of transportation have a great impact on the environment. Nearly all our modern methods of transportation rely on engines powered by fossil fuels. Without them, modern transportation would not be possible. Fossil fuels are very good 10 sources of energy. They are easy to extract, fairly cheap and are available in large quantities. However, they also pose serious problems.

Firstly, fossil fuels are non-renewable. In the past 150 years, we have used up huge amounts of fossil fuels. We could run out of oil, the most important fossil fuel, in the near future. Secondly, engines that burn fossil fuels produce carbon dioxide that kills wildlife, damages human health and causes acid rain. In the atmosphere, carbon dioxide acts as a greenhouse gas, trapping some of the sun's heat. The extra carbon dioxide released from burning fossil fuel is making Earth warmer. If carbon dioxide emissions continue, the world will get too hot for human beings.

Polluting emissions are not the only problems caused by transpollution. Traffic in cities 20 also cause congestion. Major cities around the world suffer from traffic jams. One traffic jam in Beijing lasted for nine days. Huge amounts of time and money are wasted as people sit in traffic on their way to and from work.

Noise is another kind of pollution produced by transportation. Noise is unwanted sound. It may not seem like a very serious problem but noise pollution, especially from road traffic, 25 makes people feel stressed. Over time, it can also damage their hearing.

Roads, railway tracks, docks, airports, oil refineries, petrol stations and other structures that support the transportation network also cause damage to the environment. Massive portions of land and natural habitat have been destroyed to make room for these various parts of the transportation network.

Governments have stepped up efforts to address these problems. Much time and money has been spent on researching and building reliable and affordable public transportation systems. Also, environmentalists are persuading people to carpool when travelling and to buy local produce and products whenever possible. These will help to decrease the distances 'travelled' by these foods and goods. However, the transportation 35 systems in most cities are struggling to cope. Roads and railroads are perpetually carrying far more traffic than they were designed for. As the world population grows, this headache will get worse.
